# Message from our **board chair**



2024 marks my 10th year of service on the Board of Directors for the Lodi Memorial Hospital Foundation and the beginning of my second year as Board Chair. It's amazing to me how quickly that time has gone by and how many changes there have been at Adventist Health Lodi Memorial.

I remember my first name badge that read, "Lodi Health." I still use that same name badge today,

though the name on the building has obviously changed to "Adventist Health Lodi Memorial." It's a great visual reminder to me of how our little local hospital has evolved over the years into a member of a strong network of leading centers of compassionate healthcare and wellness throughout this state. Not only that, but I like my badge photo from 10 years ago much better than one taken today.

Of course, there have been some challenges along the way. Ten years ago, I would have never imagined there would be an event like COVID-19. The strains on everyone during the lockdowns, quarantining and social distancing, were significant, yet AHLM met the challenge with courage, perseverance and empathy.

I am proud to be a part of what the LMH Foundation has been able to accomplish over the years. Together, with our donors, we have upgraded the NICU to Level II, purchased all new cancer diagnostic equipment, supported the new Cancer Center, and updated the Lab that serves four hospitals and several clinics, completing over 2 million tests a year, as well as partnering with GOT Kids, One Eighty Center and LOEL Senior Center for healthy living in our community.

In looking forward in anticipation to 2024 and beyond, I am happy to report the Foundation is in an extremely strong financial position, thanks in part to the fundraising efforts of Wayne, Carolyn, Liz, significant grant requests being fulfilled and the loving estate gifts from our friends within the community who we have lost over the years. We are grateful for their legacy that will live on through improvements in facilities, equipment, technology, education and general support at AHLM for decades to come.

I am excited to finish my term as Chair of an amazing group of volunteer board members whose leadership has continued our 43-year history. On behalf of the entire Board of Directors of the LMH Foundation, thank you all for joining us in our mission of improving the overall health in greater "livable, loveable Lodi."

## Dr. Carolyn Fowle leaves her entire estate to LMHF

Dr. Carolyn Fowle is proof that a life of professional service does not have to end in retirement. Up until six months before her passing at age 97, she continued to work full-time as a clinical psychologist, counseling patients dealing with challenging issues that prevented them from living full lives. During her long career she recognized the importance of a community hospital and committed her life work and assets to support Lodi Memorial Hospital (Adventist Health Lodi Memorial).

Upon her passing in 2023, Dr. Fowle's goals were fulfilled by designating Lodi Memorial Hospital Foundation as the sole beneficiary of her estate. This \$6 million gift will prove to be transformational for the hospital and community and will be used exclusively for capital projects to expand and improve healthcare in the greater Lodi community. In addition to leaving her estate assets, she was also an annual supporter for more than six decades and participated in every capital campaign. In 2010 she donated \$2 million to build the Healing Garden during the South Tower expansion. We are blessed to have had such a loyal and steadfast donor.

Dr. Fowle's pathway to success started in Nebraska, at the remarkably young age of 11, when she entered

high school and then went on to Nebraska State University at age 15. She was awarded a fellowship at the University of Chicago and later obtained her Ph.D. degree from the University of the Pacific.

She made her way to Lodi in 1952 and began teaching kindergarten at Leroy Nichols Elementary School, when her husband, Charles Fowle, took a position at Farmers & Merchants Bank. After a few years, she was appointed as the school psychologist, and in 1965, when the Lodi Unified School District was formed, she was promoted to Director of Pupil Personnel Services and Special Education for the entire district.

As a prominent member of the clinical psychology community, she was recruited by the State of California to form and manage the Research and Evaluation Department that certified school counseling programs. She also served for 16 years as a forensic psychologist and expert witness to the Sacramento Superior Court, evaluating prisoners.

She started her private practice in 1966, which continued for more than 55 years. Asked why she worked so long, she replied, "I enjoy my patients; many of whom became friends. I was privileged that they would share their innermost feelings and know that I would respect them."

Dr. Fowle was grateful for the referrals from the physicians at Lodi Memorial Hospital in the early years when patients required doctor referrals. She said, "The doctors and the hospital made my practice, and for that I will forever be grateful." Her legacy of giving has motivated many others to support causes in our community as well.

In addition to her work, Dr. Fowle loved to travel and visited 87 countries around the world. She was passionate about meeting people and understanding cultures of the world. Her office was filled with mementos from her journeys and remarkable photos of exotic places that we all wish we could visit.

There are countless phrases, like "you're never too old," or "age is just a number," but Dr. Carolyn Fowle was proof that if you are passionate about life, you love people and you love your work, there is never a reason to quit. Dr. Fowle was a shining example of how to live a full and fulfilled life of service and passion for people and community.

# LMHF funds intensive outpatient teen health program



As part of our mission to support "healthy living" in our community, LMH Foundation funded the One Eighty Center (formerly Teen 180) Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) and Base Camp remodel. This critically important program is designed to counsel, support and nurture vulnerable teens who suffer from acute mental illness. Sadly, nearly 200 teens in our school district have attempted to end or considered ending their lives. Many teens struggle with the transition to adulthood, and some even find it overwhelming. The impacts of social media on self-esteem have increased some 27 percent during the isolation of the COVID-19 Pandemic, and some teens cannot find their way back to a balanced reality.

Jake and Ali MacGregor, founders and co-directors of the One Eighty Center have developed an intensive treatment program to break the cycle of depression and despair. Student/clients meet three days a week for three-hour sessions (sometimes including family members) and participate in group activities and adventure challenges, designed to change perceptions of what can be and to develop a positive and fulfilling





lifestyle. The success of this program has been noted across the nation with many cities attempting to replicate this program. In addition to the IOP, some 20 counselors see nearly 1,100 students per week in 20 schools within Lodi and Northern San Joaquin County.

Funds were also given to complete a buildout of the Base Camp, a separate One Eighty Center residence used for group gatherings, counseling and adventure challenges preparation. LMH Foundation is proud to partner with the One Eighty Center to help the youth in our community.

### Foundation and hospital sponsor Power of One

Each year the United Way of San Joaquin County hosts a county-wide event to coalesce regional nonprofits and commercial businesses to rally around an important issue in the area. In 2023, the focus was on mental health, as it has become a top priority in the semiannual Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA), which is intended to guide efforts of highest need in the county.

Since the LMH Foundation committed to sponsor a teen mental health program (Intensive Outpatient Program to reduce teen suicide) operated by the highly effective One Eighty Center, and the hospital continues to support healthy living in the community, together we were the main event sponsors of the 2023 Power of One event. Approximately 300 people attended the event and heard from the Time Magazine "Kid of the Year," a dynamic 13-year-old speaker who spent his pre-teen years raising funds for causes and became a significant philanthropist even before he had his first job.

It was an inspiring event that challenged each of us to do more for others and to remember that it takes all of us working together to solve problems and improve lives in the region.

# AHLM goes with new hospitalist group

A few decades ago, as medical practices evolved and specialties became more prominent, family practice doctors became overwhelmed with patient demand. As part of this evolution, when patients were hospitalized neither the family practice doctor nor their specialist had the time to make rounds, as it was in the past. This resulted in the creation of the Hospitalist system, where a group of doctors practiced only in the hospital, making rounds on all patients and working with the resources of the hospital to treat and heal patients.

In the beginning of this transition, many patients were disappointed to not have their trusted doctor make calls and advise on their case. However, the Hospitalist system became the new approach to hospital care, and today when you are an inpatient at AHLM, your care is managed by the Hospitalist team. These physicians work together to provide continuity and consistency of care, and it is imperative that the Hospitalist doctor is diligent and communicates clearly with patients, their families, and other doctors.

Hospitals contract with companies that specialize in recruiting and managing doctors that choose this form of practice. Over the years, AHLM has worked with several different Hospitalist groups. Most recently, to improve patient care, AHLM contracted with Vituity, a large and well-respected group of managed physicians with over 5,000 clinicians serving more than 8 million patients in 450 locations. Vituity already provided services for our anesthesiology needs for surgeries and other sedation procedures at AHLM.

At AHLM, Vituity is staffed to have a patient-to-doctor ratio lower than the national average, which will certainly improve outcomes and provide better communication with patients and their families, often resulting in earlier discharges and fewer readmissions.

# Foundation supports **doctors reception**

At least twice a year, AHLM hosts receptions for physician and medical staff leaders to gather, meet new members, socialize and simply take a break from the daily routine of healthcare. In former years, doctors would see each other at the hospital, enjoy lunch together or socialize after hours, but in the new era with clinic doctors and specialists working outside of the hospital, it is rare that the doctors' paths cross.

The LMH Foundation provides support for the receptions and finds these gatherings a great opportunity to meet doctors, hear updates and learn more about their practices, discuss improvements needed and to solicit their participation in fundraising programs that the Foundation executes each year.

# **Raymus Foundation** awards record grant to LMHF

For the last several years, the Antone and Marie Raymus Foundation has awarded grants to the LMH Foundation to support patient care programs and purchase of critical equipment for AHLM. The first grant in 2019 was \$25,000 for the Music Therapy program, and in subsequent years a record \$400,000 was awarded to purchase nine ICU beds needed as the result of required expansion of the ICU during the COVID-19 Pandemic crisis.

In 2023, a new record grant of \$611,000 was received from the Raymus Foundation for the purchase of three Stryker Imaging Towers used at the hospital for all forms of surgery. With more than 6,000 surgeries a year at AHLM, the towers will increase

positive outcomes from surgical procedures. The units include advanced features such as temperature-controlled air entering the surgical area, smoke exhausting from cauterization during procedures, real-time 4K video imaging of the surgical environment, fluorescence contrast imaging to identify blood perfusion and tissue condition, as well as electronic medical records archiving during procedure.

This updated technology will allow surgeons to navigate procedures with increased clarity, reducing time and trauma, which will in turn reduce recovery times. The generosity of the Raymus Foundation continues to increase the quality of care in our region that serves more than 300,000 lives. We are grateful for the Raymus Foundation's trust in the hospital and for the critical financial assistance that funds this equipment.



Foundation partners for **healthy living** 

In compliance with the revised LMH Foundation Mission Statement, the Foundation has formed partnerships with impactful local nonprofits creating "healthy living lifestyles" in the community. In 2023 we supported the following organizations to serve specific sectors of our population:

- LOEL Senior Center supporting a route for the Meals on Wheels program
- GOT Kids Foundation supporting the Dolly Parton Library reading program for kids zero to five years
- One Eighty Center supporting the teen mental health "Intensive Outpatient Program"
- Books for Babes supporting the newborn family reading program
- Scholarship Program providing 41 academic scholarships for seniors, college students and healthcare staff
- United Way supporting the Power of One event focused on improving mental health in the county

The goal for 2024 is to increase our community support in an effort to create a culture of healthy living, thus reducing chronic diseases related to poor nutrition, sedentary lifestyles, stress and illiteracy.

### Harlin and Nancy Watts Scholarship begins in 2024

Following the passing of beloved LMH Foundation Board Member, Nancy Watts, her loving husband, Harlin, honored her by donating funds to establish a scholarship for students looking to enter the healthcare field. In 2023, Harlin donated \$200.000 to establish an endowment to fund annual scholarships to deserving students. This scholarship is personal and meaningful to the Foundation leaders as Nancy served as a board member for more than 25 years and was Chair of the Scholarship Committee, expanding the program year after year.

As a former math and reading teacher at Lodi Middle School, Lodi Adult School and as an Adjunct Professor for Chapman College, Nancy impacted countless students with her enthusiasm for learning. She was a founding member of the Lodi Unified School District Technology Task Force during the early days of computers and a member of the Chamber of Commerce Education Committee. Nancy was devoted to her community and served on the Board of the Lodi Women's Center as well as Family and Youth Services. As a member of Lodi Methodist Church, she helped organize the first endowment program of the local church and went on a mission to Cambodia in 2014.

# Scholarships near \$80,000 in 2023



We had a tremendous number of worthy candidates for our Lodi Memorial Hospital Foundation and Arthur C. and Florence Boehmer Scholarships this year, awarding 41 students for a total of \$79,500. High school seniors, previous awardees in college and Adventist Health employees continuing their education applied and had their applications reviewed by the six-member Scholarship Committee. This committee consists of four LMH Foundation board members, an employee of AHLM who was a past scholarship recipient and is chaired by Carolyn Hoff, LMH Foundation staff.

These 41 winners impressed the committee with their academic achievements, school and community involvement, work experience and determination to achieve their goals. Scholarship recipients will attend colleges such as UC Berkeley, UC Davis, Point Loma, Notre Dame, and UOP. Some will be studying to become speech language pathologists, doctors, MRI techs, civil engineers and pharmacists.

Committee members were able to get to know some of the finalists a bit better during their Zoom interviews. The goal is to award at least 50 percent of the scholarships to those pursuing a degree in a healthcare field. Lately, the average exceeds 70 percent, with the hope that they will return to serve our community.

Application letters and packets go out in December to 21 counselors within the Lodi Unified School District and AHLM service area, ads appear in the Lodi News-Sentinel and information runs in the hospital newsletter announcing the January 1 to March 1 application period. # Why is Lodi a memorial hospital?

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Memorial plaque at entry to Adventist Health Lodi Memorial

As the phrase goes, "Freedom is not always free," and that is certainly true for wars. Few remember that we lost 131 brave souls from Lodi during World War II. They gave the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom.

To honor those heroes, in 1945, the founding fathers of the new hospital in Lodi chose to make it a memorial to those lost and thus the name of the hospital was Lodi Memorial Hospital. One veteran who gave it all was Fredrick Kautz, brother of John Kautz. (The Kautz family name is familiar to many Lodians as they own Ironstone Vineyards and Bear Creek Winery, as well as John and Gail having four children who attended Lodi schools and have contributed greatly to our region.) Fredrick joined the Navy before his 19th birthday and was a brave and loyal Navy aviator who served as tail gunner on a tactical bomber. His flight squadron conducted lowlevel bombing raids of ships and strategic locations with immense success until May 1, 1945, when the plane became radio silent over enemy territory and was found several years later. All crew members were sadly lost.

The photo to the left lists all of the Lodians who died in the war. There are many familiar family names, and over the next several years we will feature individuals to continue the legacy of appreciation for their gift of freedom.

In 2015 when the hospital affiliated with the Adventist Health System, those leaders showed profound respect by retaining "memorial" in the name of the hospital, thus it is Adventist Health Lodi Memorial. Let us always remember why "memorial" is such an important tribute.

### **New TVs** improve patient experience

Whether you are visiting the hospital for an appointment or as an inpatient, televisions can serve as a distraction and entertainment. With the South Tower approaching 15 years old, and the original hospital more than 70 years old, it was time to upgrade the television systems to contemporary standards.

The LMH Foundation was asked to fund the Care Channel, which provides a stream of calming videos and soothing music found to provide many benefits during the healing process. After looking into the Care Channel, it was determined that the entire television system was sorely out of date. Some rooms had televisions with only one channel and others broadcast snowy pictures.

Realizing the benefits to hundreds of patients, the Foundation Board of Directors decided to fund a complete and total upgrade to replace everything with the latest equipment and technology.

The upgrade included replacing more than 200 televisions, updated cabling, a new channel management system (DirecTV with dozens of channel

## **Dr. Kenneth Mullen** honored as Board Member Emeritus

Having served more than 50 years as a local family practice physician, Lodi Unified School District board member, Lodi High School sports team doctor and countless other civic contributions, Dr. Kenneth H. Mullen is a legacy and an icon of the community.

Dr. Mullen's legacy actually begins with his father, Robert (Bob) Mullen, Esq., who was one of the original founders of Lodi Memorial Hospital in 1948 and the Lodi Memorial Hospital Foundation in 1980.

As the hospital was growing, young Ken Mullen attended UC Berkeley to earn his undergraduate degree, UC Santa Barbara for a master's degree and Tulane University for medical school. After his residency at UC Davis Medical Center, Dr. Mullen returned to Lodi and began what would become one of the most successful and impactful family medicine practices in the area. But that was not enough, because he also grew up in Lodi and played sports for Lodi High School, so he volunteered to be the team doctor for Lodi High School and attended hundreds of sporting events, making sure the athletes were healthy and safe.

From Dr. Mullen's involvement with the school district, he realized there were many ways to improve education in Lodi, and he ran for the local school board and served 12 years (three as president). He was instrumental in passing the first school bond in several years to repair and upgrade facilities and build new schools for the growing population. In the latter years of his practice, following the legacy of his father, the Foundation founder, Dr. Mullen joined the LMH Foundation Board of Directors and used all these experiences and connections to help the Foundation raise funds for vital medical equipment and expansion of the hospital.

Dr. Mullen has served our community throughout his life with professionalism and compassion, drawing respect with every effort. We are proud to grant Dr. Kenneth H. Mullen the title of Board Member Emeritus. We look forward to benefit from Dr. Mullen's experience and counsel for years to come.



### In-Kind Gifts

LMH Foundation receives donations of supplies, equipment and services from both individuals and companies that support our programs and events. A receipt is sent for each gift.

### S Mullen Society

### Acorns to Oaks (Legacy) Society

A society recognizing donors who have acknowledged that a bequest gift to the LMH Foundation is included in their estate plan.

### Charitable Trusts

LMH Foundation has a Planned Giving Program, which includes various gift instruments, including Charitable Remainder Trusts. Many of our Acorns to Oaks members have used this vehicle for giving.
